This month's photograph and story were submitted by Mary Mettler.



This photograph, taken by well-known frontier photographer, George F. Blackburn, is of the Turtle Mountain Hotel, built about 1885 in Dunseith, Rolette County, Dakota Territory. Shown is the proprietor, my great-grandfather, Philip Thomas (P.T.) METLER. He is holding the horse on which sits his daughter, Eva; on the other horse is his son Pete (Philip Jr.). His wife, Alice Farnsworth Metler, who really ran the hotel, is at the door of the hotel.

P.T. was made Justice of the Peace when Dunseith was established in 1884. He also became Postmaster in 1887. Guess where he moved the post office? To his hotel, of course! Ultimately and sadly, P.T. and Alice lost the hotel.

Note that the family name was spelled with one "t" at that time. In the early 1890s there was a horse thief named Charles Metler, so the family changed the spelling to Mettler. Although I hoped he was a relative, we have never found a connection.
