
This month we pay tribute to our **Irish Roots**. The photographs and story were submitted by our Photo Editor, **Cathy H. Paris**.

March 17 is fast approaching, so you may want to check your closet to make sure you have something green to wear. As a child, I was always in a painful quandary as to whether or not I should wear green on St. Patrick's Day. After spending the last several years researching the history of my family, I no longer have misgivings.

When I asked my maternal grandmother, Helen Nimmo, a somewhat non-practicing Episcopalian, if she was Irish, she gave me a look that could kill. She paused a few moments to regain her composure, then explained that her father was born in England and her mother had Scottish roots. All this was true, as far as it went.

When I asked my mother if I was Irish, she assured me that while I had some Irish, I was a "mix." I created this graphic so you can appreciate how mixed up I really am!

I never had the chance to talk about being Irish with my paternal grandmother, Mary Fitzgerald. She died in 1918 of the Spanish influenza, and was buried in the Catholic cemetery in Portsmouth, New Hampshire. She was born in Penacook, New Hampshire, on September 20, 1886, the daughter of Jennie McCormick, a



young immigrant from County Clare, and James E. Fitzgerald, the American-born son of immigrants from County Kerry.

I wonder what Mary Fitzgerald would have thought about her son marrying my mother. And what do you think my mother's mother, Helen, would say if she knew that despite her disclaimers, I have discovered that all four of her grandparents were from Ireland?

This month I pay tribute to my grandmothers, pictured below, and their discordant Irish roots: Helen Elizabeth Nimmo (1898 - 1976), left, and Mary Elizabeth Fitzgerald (1886 - 1918), right.
