California Ancestors: Diverse Heritage, Shared History

Photo Tributes to the CGS Family

This month's ancestor photo was submitted by Kathryn Doyle.



I discovered my gg-grandmother, Mary Ann "Mollie" Briggs (1848-1880), on the the very first census record I ever found, using Soundex film in the "old days" before census images came online. She became lost from our family in just two generations - my grandmother didn't know even the first names of either of her father's parents - only where they had lived. The "Health" column on the 1880 census form told me why: "Mary A. Briggs," wife of William, had "Typhoid fever." I later learned she died just six weeks later, leaving four children under the age of ten.

Through the power of the Internet and with the help of a Rootsweb Mail list, I connected with a cousin in Florida who informed me that Mary Ann was the daughter of Henry and Elizabeth Ross Glant of McVeytown, Mifflin County, Pennsylvania. She is buried there in the GLANT family plot at Mattawana Cemetery.

Like pieces of a puzzle, an unidentified tintype in Pennsylvania and a labeled (but forgotten) portrait in Texas came together to bring Mollie Briggs back to her family. Now the closing words of her obituary are true again: "Dear sister, thou art gone but not forgotten."

The portrait above is an enhanced and restored image scanned from the tintype.
