Workshop: Working with Footnotes and Indexing





Photo Tributes to the CGS Family

This month's photograph comes from Past-president Jane Knowles Lindsey.



When I was a young girl, my mother kept a special metal box in her dresser drawer. I loved to rummage through her treasures and try on the pieces of jewelry. There was one star-shaped pin with red stones, which I now know was the oldest piece. All my mother could tell me was that her father gave it to her. My mother's mother died when she was only six years old.

In 1985, just a few years after I became interested in genealogy, I traveled to Cincinnati with my mother to visit the hometown of my grandmother, Violet Eberle Hayes. My newly discovered cousins presented me with several family photographs including this one of my great-great grandmother, Magdalena Gerth Eberle (1841-1913). I placed them on my family photo wall.

In 1987, my husband and I and our children lived in France for a year. We traveled to Germany several times and I began to notice brooches like the mysterious red pin. Similar jewelry was sold in stores and antique shops all over the country so I realized the brooch must have come down through the German side of the family.

After we returned home, I was dusting the family photos one day and I looked more closely at the one of Magdalena. I was amazed to see the brooch in the photo! My mother gave it to me in the early 1990s. Although it is not worth much, it is a family heirloom that I will always cherish.
