The California Genealogical Society and Library works with FamilySearch to provide free online access to the records of funeral homes in the San Francisco area. These records are among the few collections that date back prior to 1906 and the San Francisco earthquake. They are great substitutes for death records

for that time period.

Decennial Dues Increase

Board Votes to Continue Fiscal Tradition

California Ancestors

Photo Tributes to the CGS Family Edited by Lorna Wallace

This month, in honor of St. Patrick's Day, we pay tribute to **Mary "Mollie" Donlon Flynn**, Irish grandmother of Mary Caroline Chunn.



My maternal grandmother, Mary Pauline "Mollie" Donlon (1899-1989), was born and raised on a farm in El Rio, formerly known as New Jerusalem, Ventura County, California. She was the ninth of twelve children of John Donlon and Mary Caroline Forrer who were the first couple to be married in the New Jerusalem Church in 1886. They came from entirely different backgrounds: he sailed to America from Ireland and she came to California from Utah in a covered wagon.

Mollie attended Rio Grammar School, where her father was a trustee, and graduated from Oxnard High School. In 1920 she married George Henry Flynn of nearby Camarillo. They had four children, including my mother, Patsy Flynn. They were wonderful grandparents, always showing genuine delight in their grandchildren. We called them Nana and Gramper.

In addition to superb domestic skills, her many talents included hat-making and oil painting. She was in the same bridge club for over fifty years. A lot of her time was spent visiting and calling her sisters and brothers and, of course, her children and grandchildren. She lived in the same county her whole life and had many longlasting friendships. I once heard someone tell her, "George got a peach when he married you." The Ventura County Donlons have roots in Derryshanogue, County Longford, Ireland. In fact, there are Derryshanogue Donlons all over the globe. There will be an exhibit in their honor this year at the <u>Dublin Heritage Center</u> in Dublin, California, from April 20 to June 24, 2011.
