



California Ancestors: From Here, There, and Everywhere!

Photo Tributes to the CGS Family

This month, member Dick Rees honors his grandfather, **R. George Rees**.



Dating an old photo can be difficult. Not so with this one where everything was included except the year!

The young man under the calendar is my grandfather, R. George Rees. The photo was taken in an office at the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad where he worked at the time. Using the <u>Day of the Week</u> <u>Calculator by Ancestor Search</u>, I was able to determine the year.

Colleague and friend Pam Miller noticed that the clock on the wall is a calendar clock which gives the day and month, as well as the time. So this photo was taken at 11:36 a.m., Saturday, 23 August 1902.

My grandfather was nineteen years old and had married his first wife, Eva Bilson, earlier that year. She was the mother of Willis, born the day after Christmas 1902, and Maude, born 1904. Eva died a few months after Maude's birth.

My grandfather left the railroad and was apprenticed to a firm of undertakers in New Haven, later going into the funeral business with a partner. In 1909 he began courting my grandmother, Pearl Mead, a Vermonter who was living in Farmington, Connecticut. (I have no idea how they met.) He would take Willis with him and they would travel on one trolley car until it reached the end of the line, then get on another one, and eventually arrived in Farmington. They were married on New Year's Day 1910. George was 26; Pearl was 33.
