This month we honor CGS member Penny Hazelton Pollock's grandparents, DeWitt and Benja Lepley Hazelton, who were married for almost fifty years. Happy Valentine's Day!



Dewitt Charles Hazelton (1891-1979) and Benja Franklin Lepley (1887-1970)

Benja F. Lepley was born 17 August 1887 at Prospect, Butler Co., Pennsylvania, three months after her father, Benjamin Franklin Lepley, died in the same borough. Her mother, Lida K. (Warren) Lepley, raised three children on a teacher's salary, supplemented with music lessons.

Benja followed her mother's path into teaching. In 1906 she graduated from nearby Slippery Rock Normal School, now Slippery Rock University. After several years teaching in Butler county schools, she moved to Stevensville, Ravalli Co., Montana, in 1913. She lived with her uncle William Lepley and his sister Emily.

Two years later, she moved to California where she taught in Los Angeles city schools for more than forty years. There she met, and in 1920, married my grandfather, DeWitt Charles Hazelton. He had made his own way from McKean Co., Pennsylvania, to Blue Earth Co., Minnesota, and then to Los Angeles during World War I.

Grandma Benjie was a real lady and always the teacher. My brother and I spent a week or two every summer (when the Navy landed us in California) with my Hazelton grandparents. We made decorations for 4th of July and Mother's Day and at Christmas we made paper chains and decorated cookies. She taught me to sew, interested me in quilting and was the inspiration for my addiction to genealogy.
