
California Ancestors: They Came from Everywhere

Photo Tributes to the CGS Family

This Labor Day, we honor Earl Warren Wright, grandfather of California Genealogical Society board member Jim Sorenson, and his work for the Standard Oil Company

It's a Job!



Excerpt of the 1899 letter to Earl Wright Morgan (1879-1953)

Morgan (1845-1888) and Julia Lillian Sweney (1850-1915). A month before his tenth birthday, Earl became "the man of the family" when his father died suddenly. At age twelve, he took a job sweeping floors in a drug store for \$.50 per week to help support his mother and two elder sisters. Six years later he was helping fill prescriptions and making \$5.00 per week. Working cut into school time so he was twenty when he finally graduated from high school.

Earl searched for a clerical position and in September 1899, received the following letter from Standard Oil Company in Whiting, Indiana on the shore of Lake Michigan.

"Dear Sir.

Your letter under date of Sept. 12 addressed to Mr. Chas. Dudley was handed to me a few days ago. I have been unable to find anything for you of a clerical nature. But if you think you are able to do pretty hard work "out doors" under conditions that are anything but pleasant in the winter, I can give you a start at from \$8.00 to \$9.00 a week. Your future will depend on your abilities and efforts. Yours Truly

W. D. Rheem Asst. Supr."

My grandfather moved to Whiting and took a job steam cleaning oil tank cars, inside and out. When he left Standard Oil in September 1907, to pursue an electrical engineering course, he possessed two letters of employment reference. The first, from Standard Oil, described two years in the refinery pipe shop and the last "six years as the Chief Draftsman head of the Drafting Department." The second letter was from the City of Whiting, Indiana stated he had been "employed by this city as Civil Engineer for several years" and was leaving the "City Engineer" position voluntarily.

Grandfather Earl rejoined Standard Oil in 1910, this time in Richmond, California. He attained a fairly high rank in their Engineering Department before leaving in the early 1920s to be manager of their office building in Los Angeles. By 1930, he was making \$115 per week. Earl Wright Morgan retired in 1943. He died 26 January 1953, in Los Angeles.

The 1899 photograph of my grandfather was taken the same year he went to work for Standard Oil.
