
You'll find the most recent editions in the back room. Older editions are in the regular stacks. All of our library's periodicals are listed in

# Ancestor Tribute: They Came from Everywhere!

## **My Break-Through Uncle**

Henry Clark Wright, 1797-1870

When selecting my favorite ancestor, I chose to highlight the family member who made the most significant contribution to my study of my family origins, my great-great-great-great-grand uncle, Henry Clarke Wright. My research on him gave me the information to break through a genealogical brick wall and provided considerable insight into my ancestors' lives in upstate New York.

Because I was having trouble finding anything on Moses, my direct ancestor, I researched his brother, Henry. This revealed that he was an author of several books and a lecturer on abolition and women's rights. Clues eventually led -- over many years and through several states and archives -- to Henry's autobiographical book, *Human Life: Illustrated in My Individual Experience as a Child, a Youth, and a Man* 

(1849), which included genealogical information as an appendix; an 1848 diary; and a copy of family Bible records. By researching Henry, I was able to open the doors to a wealth of information about the entire family, including earlier generations. *(Photo edited by Lorna Wallace.)*
