Ancestor Tribute

Erling Anton Klabo

Erling Anton Klabo, my grandfather, was born in Mosjoen, Norway on December 1, 1879. He was the last of 8 children born to his parents Peder Anderson Klabo and Maren Zindsen.

Erling was a clock maker and jeweler as was his father before him. He was sent to Copenhagen, Denmark as a young man to learn his craft. Erling married Karen Olivia Dahl, daughter of Herman Dahl and Juliana Olsen at the Dolstad Church in Mosjoen. Erling and Karen had 5 children, the 4th child, Margaret, was my mother.

Despite much research, that elusive rumored Klabo Royal ancestor has not been discovered, yet. There was a distant great grandfather, Henrik von Borchenhagen who was a German Baron but no royalty. By all rights Erling should have had Pederson as his last name, following Norwegian custom, but his father whose middle name was Klabo appropriated Klabo as his last name upon moving to Mosjoen from Bronnoy.

Erling quickly learned English while in Norway as his parents would not speak to him until noon each day unless he spoke to them in English. It also helped that the family tutor married his sister, Ursella. Erling and his family came to America in 1914 and to California in 1924, settling in Piedmont. He had a clock shop and beaded purse repair business on 16th street in Oakland until the mid 1930s. Erling who was a prolific letter writer died in 1942. Many of his letters were to his daughter, Margaret, and are now in my possession.
