Jeffrey Vaillant dipped into and out of genealogy with the middle part being raising a family. He dipped back into genealogy about ten years after his mother's death. She researched via pen and paper and postal mail. Jeff took her research and with the DNA and virus triggers plowed into family research. Research led to classes at CGS, SLIG, GRIP and local, regional and national conferences. Continuing education is a key to good research. He is a past President of CGS and the Sonoma County Genealogical Society and has served on the boards of many other genealogical associations. He has a BA in history and has a special interest in American Civil War research. He teaches genealogy each month at the San Rafael Public Library. Jeff is a member of APG and is working toward certification as a professional genealogist.



Matthew Berry became interested in family history research in 2003 during a family reunion. He was born in San Diego and grew up in Foster City before attending and receiving a BA and MS from the University of California, Berkeley, and an MBA from Santa Clara University. Now retired from Wells Fargo Bank, Matt has been a member of CGS since 2006, has served as a desk duty volunteer in the past, and has taught several CGS classes on Microsoft Word skills for genealogists. His genealogical research has focused on California, New England and the American mid-west.

She has served as a volunteer genealogist with the 2016 and 2018 Nikkei Pilgrimages to Angel Island and as Assistant Editor of The California Nugget.







Growing No-show Trend for CGS Classes: Nominal Class Fees in 2019

Free classes are a wonderful privilege of CGS membership that many enjoy. With our limited classroom space, classes are often full. This year, there's been a trend of registered members not showing up and not cancelling their reservation. The rate of no-shows has been running close to one-third of registered attendees. Examples below.



Why does this matter? First of all, it means those on the waiting list have no chance to get notification and fill in those spots. Also our speakers can't help but be aware of the empty chairs and fewer folks to benefit from all the work they put into sharing their expertise.

In 2019, consistent with recommendations in the strategic plan and approval by the Board, some classes for members will have a small fee. This will be phased in over the year. Many classes, including our Introduction to Genealogy and a new series on the third Saturday of each month at the Oakland FamilyHistory Library, will be free. We also provide links with your class reservation and reminder to make it easier to notify us of a cancellation. We hope this will address the problem above and provide some much-needed funding for even more and better offerings.





Excel for Genealogists

Stewart loves spreadsheets! He is an expert in Microsoft Excel using spreadsheets in genealogy quite frequently. Laying out all the data in Excel can help researchers see gaps in knowledge or correlations between data points. Breakthroughs can easily happen by visualizing data in spreadsheets. Stewart shows many examples of his use of spreadsheets to track newspaper clippings, a vital records catalog, tracking ancestor addresses over time, and tracking whole families over many censuses. Stewart will teach how to use Excel filter, sorting, color coding, calculations and many other functions.

Since 1898, we have been an organization staffed by many dedicated volunteers. If you are a CGS member, we can use your time, skills and expertise!


We are always looking for members who can help out with the following:
